Varo Registry www.netdreams.com/registry/ The Varo Registry site, named after surrealist painter Remedios Varo, plays host to the Women Artists Listserv and the Feminist Art History Listserv moderated by Robin Masi. Both have proved valuable discussion lists for women artists and feminist art historians. The site has special features on over 60 contemporary artist members and produces a newsletter as well as Varo-Announce. The Varo Registry began as a research project at the Women Artists Archive, a web-site and library archive at the Ruben Salazar Library, Sonoma State University built on the collection of JJ Petersen and Wilson archives, one of the earliest feminist art history projects in the USA. <rmasi@ziplink.net> The World's Women On-Line wwol.inre.asu.edu Developed by Muriel Magenta at Arizona State University, for presentation at the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, China in 1995, this electronic art network remains the largest directory of women artists' and brief artists' statements and biographies worldwide. Presentations at other venues and exhibition spaces have followed its showing in Beijing, at Artemisia Galley, Chicago and the Annenberg Center, Philadelphia Artists are listed very simply in alphabetical order, with thumbnail images to scan the archives quickly. The opening 3-D computer animation on the title page is by Muriel Magenta. <muriel.magenta@asu.edu> Virtual Anatomy, St Petersburg www.dux.ru/virtual Virtual Anatomy is a project started by Alla Mitrofanova and Olga Suslova exploring postmodernist/post-structuralist theories of the body. The e-zine,in English, experiments with different formats, blinking graphics, running headers, moving images to present, question and contextualise ideas related to Deleuze & Guattari, Irigaray and Kristeva amongst others. The project is run from Gallery 21's server, St Petersburg's media art center, which also plays host to the Cyber-Femin-Club, a 30-strong collective, which runs cultural and

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social programs for women related to exploring new technologies.
